

Here, Connect Magazine sits down with David to learn more about his interesting road to the position and his vision for The Ireland Funds.

Living in Ireland, I have seen on a daily basis

the impact that The Ireland Funds' investment makes on our island. Traveling internationally in philanthropic circles, I have met so many wonderful people committed to supporting the The Ireland Funds' mission. When the opportunity arose to bring my experience across governance, philanthropy and international business, to the role of President & Chief Executive of The Ireland Funds America, I knew this was a special role where I could make a real difference.

I grew up in Cork and Kerry spending my formative years living within walking distance of Muckross House and Killarney National Park. From an early age I would have been aware of the phenomenal impact of the Vincent family's generosity to the state and the impact of philanthropy on our country.

As a recipient of the St. Brendan's Irish-American scholarship (sponsored by a longtime supporter of The Ireland Funds, Denis Kelleher) to New York early in my career, I was personally a beneficiary of philanthropy and had the opportunity to work on Wall Street for a number of years.

Returning to Ireland with some excellent experience gained in NY was a springboard for my career in the private sector, where I spent much of the next decade commuting between Cork, Europe and the US building an Irish tech start-up specializing in governance, risk and compliance management solutions for highly regulated industries. The company was ultimately acquired by a NASDAQ listed organization.

When the University of Limerick Foundation offered me the role of Chief Executive in 2008, the prospect of leading one of Ireland's leading University Foundations was compelling. The Foundation had been founded and chaired by Chuck Feeney of The Atlantic Philanthropies and then led by

Lew Glucksman, a longtime supporter of The Ireland Funds. On meeting the Board, I relished the opportunity to work with inspirational philanthropic leaders across industry, culture and education. In 2014, when Loretta Brennan Glucksman stepped down as Chair of The Ireland Funds, I was privileged that she agreed to become Chair of UL Foundation to lead us through the Foundation's most successful fundraising chapter. I spent a decade with UL Foundation raising and investing philanthropic funding in projects with enormous and tangible impacts.

I consider it a privilege to facilitate philanthropic giving. It is an honor to work with leading figures in business, industry, arts, culture, sport and politics. With this comes a responsibility to ensure that The Ireland Funds stays as relevant in the years ahead as it was in 1976.

My vision for The Ireland Funds is that it will be sustainable, impactful and compelling in the years ahead.

Our Donor base has very high expectations of us. We need to surpass their expectations. We can only do this by our focus on return-on-investment and tangible impact. The key to our success is a completely transparent approach. When you build credibility and respect over time, you attract those who want to see their monies deployed to maximum effect in an impactful way. People want to see their philanthropic investment provide a return that can be measured, sustained and a catalyst for future success over a period of time.

Sustainable Compelling Impactful



LITERACY CHANGES EVERYTHING

LITERACY IS... "THE ABILITY TO READ, WRITE AND USE NUMERACY, TO HANDLE INFORMATION, TO EXPRESS IDEAS AND OPINIONS, TO MAKE DECISIONS AND SOLVE PROBLEMS." HELPING CHILDREN TO DEVELOP LITERACY SKILLS GIVES THEM THE TOOLS TO BREAK GENERATIONAL CYCLES OF POVERTY AND DISADVANTAGE.





Since 2012, using trained volunteers, Suas has helped over 5,500 children from the most disadvantaged communities in Ireland to improve their reading and math skills through one-to-one mentoring and smart learning materials. Over the past two years alone, with support from The Ireland Funds Australia and The Ireland Funds, it provided one-to-one support to 3,208 children and recruited over 1,000 volunteer mentors.

Worringly, one-in-three children in disadvantaged schools in Ireland experiences serious literacy difficulties. The consequences of failing to equip these children with literacy skills are stark. Teenagers with poor literacy are much more likely to experience anxiety and depression and to use drugs. Poor literacy skills restrict a range of life-choices, particularly employment. Early school leaving is highly correlated with poor labour market outcomes and ill health.

The good news is, unlike so many of the other massive and intransigent social problems Ireland faces, this challenge is solvable. With support from The Ireland Funds, Suas has developed smart, proven and simple solutions that improve children's reading and math scores. The model has already demonstrated positive outcomes in the most testing of environments.

Last year, children on the reading program had an average rate of improvement of 210% relative to the national average and a 215% average rate of improvement on the maths program.

The Suas program is also easily scalable and that's good because the demand is great and urgent. Childhood doesn't wait. There are bright eight-year-olds in primary school right now who won't survive second level education because of poor reading and math skills. "Some kids are so behind, one-to-one is pure gold dust. It makes the most impact. Especially if it's someone from outside the school environment who wins trust and develops a good relationship with the student."



MUSIC GENERATION REACHED ANOTHER MILESTONE MOMENT

in May of 2019 when it announced its latest phase of expansion, opening the door to a brighter musical future for thousands more children and young people in five further counties: Kerry, Kildare, Longford, Meath and Tipperary.

As part of Music Generation, each of the new areas will receive funding to create local access to affordable music tuition for their next musical generations, while also creating employment opportunities for professional musicians living within those communities.

Building on the first two philanthropically funded phases of Music Generation, which established the program in 20 areas between 2010 and 2017, this latest significant step will, for the first time, see the five newly-announced partnerships co-funded from the outset by the Irish Government, through the Department of Education and Skills.

MUSIC GENERATION

This follows the landmark commitment made by An Taoiseach Leo Varadkar, T.D. in December 2017, to support full nationwide roll-out of Music Generation to all remaining cities and counties by 2022, as part of the Creative Ireland Programme plan.

This is a hugely important moment for Music Generation, and evidence of what truly revolutionary, long-lasting achievements can be gained through strategic partnership-working between philanthropy, Government and local partners.


The original €7m donation from U2 and The Ireland Funds that established Music Generation in 2010 was the largest single philanthropic donation to music education in the history of the state. In July 2017 U2 and The Ireland Funds, with support from the Stavros Niarchos Foundation and Bank of America, gifted a further combined donation of €6.3m to expand Music Generation into new areas of Ireland.

The tangible outcomes and long lasting impact of Music Generation have also already secured ongoing, sustainable partnership funding of €3.5m annually from the Department of Education and Skills, which is matched by local partners. By 2022 it's estimated that the total annual funding contribution from the exchequer, together with Local Music Education Partnerships, will reach €13m.

Looking ahead to 2022, the original vision of Music Generation's parent company, Music Network, for a publicly supported national system of local music education services appears close on the horizon.

"That Music Generation continues to flourish is a testament to what can be achieved through meaningful public-philanthropic partnership-working. I would like to particularly acknowledge the commitment of our government partners in the Department of Education and Skills who have backed this fantastic initiative for the long-term and who are now supporting it to grow nationally, in addition to the local partners in new and existing areas whose on-the-ground leadership is vital to the program's success."

For four years now, Music Generation's South Dublin partnership has been working together with St Ronan's National School — a multi-denominational, DEIS category school based in Clondalkin — to establish a strings program. Students from third to fifth class, ranging in age from 8 to 12, receive weekly violin tuition and, in sixth class, are offered the chance to join the school strings orchestra. The impact of the partnership has already surpassed the expectations of the school staff, who have witnessed their students' growth and achievement both within and outside of the music room. For the young musicians, the benefits of access and participation are perhaps articulated best in their own words:

"It makes me feel happy. It makes me feel many things – it's a part of me. Let's just say that when I'm down, it gets me back up."


"It makes me feel that I can learn anything I want to learn. I like how I'm just able to let go, and pretty much just spread my wings."



IRISH WIEN'S SHEDS

As one member of the men's shed in Co. Waterford, south-eastern Ireland put it: "If it wasn't for the shed, I'd be a different person now. Over the past year, everything has changed. I don't mind saying that I was in a pretty dark place this time last year. I don't want to put it too dramatically, but I'd even say that the shed saved my life."











Men's sheds are shared community spaces where men can exchange skills, make friends and contribute to their communities. They allow men to explore different approaches to masculinity, based on shared experience, frankness and openness to new ideas.

Since 2011, the Irish Men's Sheds Association (IMSA) has grown from a cellphone number to an umbrella organization overseeing almost 500 community organizations throughout the island of Ireland.

The support of The Ireland Funds has allowed the Irish Men's Sheds movement to grow to almost 500 sheds engaging over 12,000 men on a weekly basis. The Irish Men's Sheds Association was a recipient of the Small Grants Round long before we became an Ireland Funds' Flagship Awardee in 2017, receiving €100,000 over 2 years. The Flagship Award has also facilitated the development of a unique Shed Support Volunteer program, whereby a single individual volunteer in each of Ireland's thirty-two counties is trained to offer logistical support and information to all the sheds in his county.

"Without the direct support, guidance and encouragement of The Ireland Funds, under its Flagship Awards and a range of other supports, it is inconceivable that men's sheds would have developed into the national phenomenon they have become," says CEO Barry Sheridan. "The endorsement of The Ireland Funds has been a signal to other donors and agencies that the Irish Men's Sheds Association is a professional and reputable charity with a genuine commitment to improving society."

The impact of the men's shed on an individual attendee can be at once subtle and dramatic. The enduring and growing appeal of the men's shed model lies in its simplicity; however, that simplicity belies a depth of impact that can be truly transformative.

The granddaughter of a men's sheds member in Co. Mayo, on Ireland's Atlantic coast, described the transformation in her grandfather's life: "For five years, we couldn't get granddad out of the house. He didn't really have an interest in anything anymore. He was very, very reluctant to join the shed, but I drove him over and said I'd come and pick him up whenever he wanted if he didn't like it. Well, to cut a long story short, we hardly see him at all now under dinnertime! He's so completely at home in the shed and everyone in town knows his name from the community projects he's involved in."

Men's sheds have been proven to benefit the health and wellbeing of their members, with over 90% of members reporting improved wellbeing. To consolidate this impact, the IMSA has introduced its Sheds for Life initiative, a health and wellbeing programme backed by Ireland's Health Services Executive. The IMSA is also advising nascent men's sheds movements in Iceland, Central Asia, the United States, Denmark, Kenya and a number of other countries and regions and was recently invited to address the World Health Organization on the benefits of men's sheds. Without the support of The Ireland Funds, this level of reach and impact would have been beyond the IMSA.

The Ireland Funds offered us support in the very early days when we had a promising idea but had not yet demonstrated success. You trusted our mission, believed in our goals and have supported us as we've grown to become an award-winning civic initiative in the heart of the Irish capital.

In 2012 the Little Museum received a small grant from The Ireland Funds to test the concept of an education class for local school children. The museum was founded in response to a need to grow civic pride locally in Ireland, and this grant was invaluable in allowing us to test the concept and trial what would go on to become the 'I Love Dublin' classes. From this initial support, we directly cultivated a corporate philanthropic partnership which allowed us to grow the free school classes to what they are today.

Our temporary exhibition programming has also been supported by The Ireland Funds. In naming our ground floor exhibition space The Ireland Funds Gallery, your support has enabled part funding of every single exhibition and their associated outreach activities. Since 2014, Flagship Funding from The Ireland Funds has enabled us to engage over 400,000 individuals with the work and goals of the museum.

Thanks to your support, the museum is now a tremendous success. With 118,779 visitors in 2018, we are officially the NUMBER ONE MUSEUM IN IRELAND on TripAdvisor—and were recently voted the number 20 museum in Europe.

THE LITTLE MUSEUM OF DUBLIN

Today we try to offer a world class visitor experience to every single person who engages with the museum. We believe this comes down to quality human interaction and storytelling. In the next decade, our ambition is to become the 'best city museum experience' in the world. We will do this with a relentless focus on three guiding principles:

HISTORY

our subject, and the focus of our work.

HOSPITALITY

we greet all visitors with a smile, with five-star service and the céad míle fáilte that they hope to find in Ireland

HUMOR


this is how we elevate an ordinary moment to a piece of drama. Our team creates experiences for our visitors which brings the Irish tradition of storytelling, craic and charm to life.

The museum occupies a landmark building at 15 St Stephen's Green, owned by our local government, Dublin City Council. We have just secured a 35-year lease in our new premises at 14 St Stephen's Green: a mirror image of 15, both built together in 1776. So our key challenge is also our biggest opportunity, because in the Spring of 2020, the museum will leave its home and in 2020 we will reopen next door.

Offering security of tenure and a permanent home for the Little Museum of Dublin, the move to 14 St. Stephen's Green will offer more space, universal access, a dedicated lecture theatre and a world-class education center for future generations of civic spirited leaders. None of this would have happened without the support of The Ireland Funds.

On behalf of our team here in the museum, thank you to The Ireland Funds for the extraordinary work that you do.

Museum Director Trevor White was born in Dublin in 1972. Educated at St. Columba's College and Trinity College, he created The Dubliner magazine, published Ireland's best-selling restaurant guide for many years, and is the author of three books. "Working with our extraordinary team is a privilege," he says. "Our goal is to create a world-class museum that embodies the history, hospitality and humor of Dublin."





IMPACT OF THE IRELAND FUNDS SUPPORT

The Little Museum of Dublin was one of The Ireland Funds first ever Flagship Awardees in 2014, receiving €100,000 over 2 years. In addition to the Flagship Award, the Museum received donor advised and grant round support totaling over \$100,000. INTEGRATED EDUCATION IN NORTHERN IRELAND

THE OPPORTUNITY TO BE EDUCATED TOGETHER

A PARENT-LED MOVEMENT

Integrated education is a parent led and grassroots response to this division. Given Northern Ireland's history it is perhaps unsurprising that it has received little political support from mainstream parties in Northern Ireland. Moreover, government has never planned for, nor created any integrated school. It was parents who established the first ever planned integrated school, Lagan College, and each school since has been created by parents either setting up new schools themselves or more recently by parents voting to change their child's existing school into an integrated school

The number of schools has risen steadily to 65, and from just 28 pupils in 1981 to over 24,000 today. Currently almost one in five first preference applications to integrated schools cannot be accommodated because so many of the schools are full to capacity.

THE CHALLENGES TO INTEGRATED EDUCATION

Independent surveys and research always demonstrate high public support for more integrated education but the gap between demand and supply remains vast. This is a great source of frustration but we must remember that there are significant barriers to growth. There is an absence of an education planning process that effectively takes into account the preference of parents and local communities when it comes to education provision and there are two separate statutory school planning authorities, one for Catholic schools and one for the rest. It took the use of litigation in 2014 by Drumragh Integrated College in Omagh, after it was denied approval to expand to meet demand, to highlight how the Department of Education was failing to implement its statutory duty to 'encourage and facilitate' integrated education properly. However, since the legal ruling, 30 school development proposals for growth and expansion have been approved, with 23 existing schools now also in line for major capital funding from the UK Treasury under the Fresh Start Agreement, totalling £295 million.



THE LEVERAGE OF THE IRELAND FUNDS' INVESTMENT

One such school to benefit is Drumlins Integrated Primary School in Ballynahinch, a school which was previously dependent on The Ireland Funds' support for additional classrooms and resources to enable it to grow and develop. Today Drumlins' dream has come true and its children enjoy a new £4 million government funded school building. Quite simply, donor investment in integrated schools has gone on to leverage hundreds of millions in rightful government funding.

Whilst helping with the successful expansion and development of existing integrated schools is a great source of pride for the IEF and our donors, we must always look to the future and the creation of more schools. We are encouraged that the majority of parents aspire to greater integration, however the challenge is that most are unaware they have a right, protected in law, to express their support for their child's school to become integrated. If parents representing 20% of pupils want integrated status for their school then they can ask their school to consider transformation to integrated status which must then be put to a ballot of all parents in the school.

INTEGRATE MY SCHOOL CAMPAIGN

The Ireland Funds were one of the first backers of our recent innovative 'Integrate My School' Campaign, launched by Liam Neeson, to empower parents. A Flagship Award in 2017 of £100,000 over 2 years from The Ireland Funds has helped to ensure there is now more interest in transformation than ever before. This was evidenced by parents at six schools across Northern Ireland voting overwhelmingly in favor of transforming to integrated status during 2019. Support from parents ranged between 85% to 100%. The democratic parental ballots include three Catholic schools; namely Seaview Primary School in Glenarm, Ballyhackett Primary School near Coleraine and St Mary's High School, Brollagh. Votes have also been held at Carrickfergus Central Primary and Harding Memorial Primary in East Belfast. Bangor Central Nursery School is the first ever Nursery School to have held such a vote. There is no guarantee that the Department of Education will approve all of these schools going forward but is clear evidence of growing demand. The 'Integrate My School' platform was enthusiastically embraced by parents in all these schools.

WHAT HAS BEEN ACHIEVED?

The Integrated Education Movement has a track record of success, winning changes in law, precedent and practice to lay foundations for the future.

SUCCESS: TRANSFORMATION

The first success was the 1978 Dunleath Act, which allowed Catholic and Protestant schools to transform to integrated status. Whilst there were no successful transformations at that time, today transformation has been accepted as a way forward and over 35% of all integrated schools have achieved this status through transformation. In 2019, parents at 6 more schools balloted in favour of transformation following the success of our 'Integrate My School' Campaign supported by the Ireland Funds.

SUCCESS: PUBLIC OPINION

The 2018 Northern Ireland wide opinion poll, carried out by Lucid Talk and commissioned by the Integrated Education Fund (IEF), reveals that almost 70% of parents interviewed said they would back a move to transform their child's school to integrated (Lucid Talk, 2018).

In the Independent Review of Integrated Education (2017) commissioned by the Department of Education, over 86% of respondents believe that integrated education is vital to breaking down barriers between Catholics and Protestants, and that there should be more integrated schools in Northern Ireland.

SUCCESS: LIFELONG INTER-RELIGIOUS CONTACT

Research shows that integrated schooling has a significant and positive social influence on the lives of those who experience it, most notably in terms of fostering cross-community friendships, reducing prejudicial attitudes and promoting a sense of security in religious, racial, or ethnically diverse environments (ARK Research Update Number III, April 2017; Stringer, 2009, 2000; Montgomery et al., 2003; McGlynn, 2001; Irwin, 1991).

Other research (Stringer et al., 2009, 2000;) has found that the intergroup contact of integrated or mixed schools can influence social attitudes, with pupils adopting more positive positions on key social issues such as politics, religion, identity, mixed marriages and integrated education.

Attendance at formally integrated schools specifically, or schools which had generally a mixed religious intake, also had a significantly positive effect on the attitudes of young Protestants to young Catholics. Dirk Schubotz, 2017.

SUCCESS: GROWTH

The number of pupils, and schools, has grown from 28 children in one school in 1981 to 24,000 children in 65 schools at nursery, primary and second level in 2019: if there were more integrated schools, offering more integrated school places, then there would be more children benefiting from this kind of education.

Integrated education is the fastest growing form of education in Northern Ireland with 30 School Development Proposals for the growth and expansion of existing integrated schools having been approved by the Department of Education since 2014, creating around 1,700 new integrated school places and yet hundreds of first preferences still being denied due to the lack of available places.

SUCCESS: PUBLIC AND POLITICAL SUPPORT

There is a commitment to support integrated education in Article 13 of the Good Friday Agreement.

The Independent Review of Integrated Education published in 2017 contained 39 recommendations to the Minister of Education regarding the growth and development of integrated education.

The most positive Department of Education guidance ever on integrated education was published in January 2018 entitled 'Integration Works'.

SUCCESS: RECURRENT FUNDING

By proving demand and viability, integrated schools have won state funding of recurrent costs for new schools provided certain stringent viability criteria are met.

SUCCESS: CAPITAL FUNDING FOR EXISTING SCHOOLS

Just under £300 million in capital funding has been agreed for integrated schools by HM UK Treasury as part of the Fresh Start Agreement, benefiting 23 out of the 65 existing integrated schools.

In June of 2019, donors attending The Ireland Funds Worldwide Conference in Belfast visited Cliftonville Integrated Primary School, which became an integrated school in 2008. Located in North Belfast, the present enrollment is 351 children plus an additional 26 in the newly-opened Nursery. Donors learned about the challenges and complexities of the education system in Northern Ireland and how The Ireland Funds is continuing to help on this journey towards integration.



The Ireland Funds, through their support for the Integrated Education Fund, has been with us every step of the way. When we needed an extra classroom, an extra teacher or even outdoor play equipment for the children, they were there when we needed them. You believed in us. ALUMNI OF INTEGRATED EDUCATION

Many former integrated school students are keen to give something back. One such person is Stuart Irwin. Stuart is a proud alumnus of Hazelwood Integrated College, a working-class school on the North Belfast peaceline, which now educates over 1,000 pupils and has developed thanks to many supporters in The Ireland Funds.

He recently completed a PhD in history at Queen's University Belfast. In 2015, Stuart was selected to participate in the Washington Ireland Program for Service and Leadership; returning in 2017 to join the Management Team. Most recently, he has joined the Belfast Hub of the Global Shapers Community, which is an initiative set up by the World Economic Forum. Stuart is a leading member of the newly-established Integrated AlumNI and says: "Attending an integrated school opened my eyes to the world and allowed me the opportunity to grow in confidence and develop the skills required to fulfil my aspirations. I am passionate about Integrated AlumNI because I want to ensure that future generations of young people in Northern Ireland are able to avail of the wonderful opportunity I enjoyed in attending an integrated school."


Autism is something which we have all become very "aware" of in recent years. Many of us can point to someone in our family or community who is on the autism spectrum and, if not, we can cite the names of a plethora of celebrities or television and fictional characters who are autistic. This is an important start – we cannot take any action if we do not realize this diversity exists. It is significant in an Irish context in particular. When I was a young child, this awareness did not exist. But in just 15 years, through a government policy shift towards inclusive education, we now have a reality that 86% of autistic young people attend mainstream school. However, awareness is just a start. The next steps, for meaningful inclusion must be understanding, empathy and action.

BUILDING CAPACITY, EDUCATING SOCIETY

SUPPORT HAS BEEN CRITICAL TO THE GROWTH OF THE ORGANIZATION.

I know this first hand. When I reached an age of self-awareness I did not want to discuss my autism for many years as I saw how people reacted when you mentioned that you were on the autism spectrum — desperately wanting to do the right thing but not knowing where to start. As a result, many of the barriers which autistic people experience today come from society's response to those with the condition. The statistics bear this out. 80% of autistic adults are under or unemployed, autistic people are at least 9 times more likely to end their lives by suicide and access to basic public services such as education and healthcare remains a marked challenge.

I was lucky, by the time I was 16, to be in school independently with a strong group of friends — but this is far from the reality for the majority and I decided to take action in establishing AsIAm because I felt the challenges autistic people met were not inevitable but could be addressed through building the capacity of autistic people and their families and educating society to fully include the autism community.



A TEAM FOR GUIDANCE AND SUPPORT

5 years on I am really excited about the progress which we are making. We are now a team of 12 staff members, half of us being autistic ourselves, ably supported and guided by an experienced, voluntary Board of Directors. Our Community Support Team provides guidance and support to autistic people and families who contact us — this ranges from basic sign-posting through to making complex representations to government bodies. In addition, it provides a range of training, support and information to autistic people and family members on managing the challenges that go with the condition and effectively advocating for yourself.

On the policy front, we have led efforts to secure a National Autism Strategy for Ireland and holding government to account in terms of providing equality of opportunity for our community. As the only National Charity undertaking this type of support role, there is a real need for us to grow our team in this area over the coming years to ensure that every family is adequately supported and the voice of the community heard at a national level.

UNIQUE INITIATIVES FOR IRELAND

Our Training and Business Advisory Team has led out on some highly unique initiatives around creating an autism-friendly society. The team operate a range of programs which start in early years settings and work their way up to supporting employers, gardai and businesses in supporting autistic members of the public using their services and opportunities. We were proud to support Dublin City University (DCU) in becoming the World's first Autism-Friendly University, and we are now rolling this initiative out across Ireland and indeed globally with the first US universities expected to be accredited by 2020.

In partnership with SuperValu, Ireland's leading retailer, we have rolled autism-friendly shopping times out across the country and supported Clonakilty in becoming the country's first autism-friendly town. In Clonakilty, over 100 organizations have undertaken training and put in place accessibility measures for autistic community members addressing the main barriers to inclusion for autistic people such as communication, predictability and control, sensory processing, judgement and attitudes.

This year we will support a further nine towns in making this commitment. This initiative, also known as the Clonakilty Commitment, follows a series of principles aimed at fostering autism inclusion and empowerment in local committees.

These are:

- · Understandable staff training
- · Environmental evaluation
- · Assistance dog-friendly
- A commitment to enact at least one change in the community

Whilst lots has been achieved there is so much more to do. We passionately believe Ireland has strong communities who, with the right support, can help us make our country the the most accessible and inclusive place in the world for the autism community. The small size of Ireland has allowed us to innovate and develop programs which we believe can be brought to other jurisdictions over time. Our ultimate goal is to be redundant and that will be achieved when we can safely say every autistic person born in Ireland has the opportunity to reach their own personal potential, whatever that may look like, and fully participate in every aspect of Irish life.

THANKS TO THE IRELAND FUNDS

We have been incredibly lucky to be supported by The Ireland Funds from day one of this journey. We were not long-established when our Secondary School Program, which aims to address bullying of autistic students through peer education, received a grant from The Ireland Funds' Small Grant Round of €3,000 in 2014. This enabled us to develop and pilot the program, which has now been delivered in well over 100 schools across the country.

Creating an Autism-Friendly University requires significant investment and from the day I explained the concept to The Ireland Funds' team they understood its importance in terms of providing opportunities for adults and ultimately reducing unemployment in the autism community, the team proactively sought support from the initiative and has secured $\mathfrak{E}_{300,000}$ to date.

It has been a true privilege to be invited to many Ireland Funds' events in both Ireland and the United States and to meet so many amazing members of The Ireland Funds' family. It is truly special knowing that there is a network of people around the world who want to support work such as ours and many have demonstrated this proactively to us with generous personal donations towards supporting our information and training services.

First a Home, then Hope

The Ireland Funds is helping ensure no vulnerable woman or child is turned away.



JENNIFER KNEW SHE HAD TO LEAVE.

The violence in her home was at a point where she feared for her life and in her words, "I was gonna end up dead." • Jennifer found a bed at Good Shepherd Cork's Edel House, an emergency accommodation which serves over 50 homeless women and children a night. • Jennifer spent the next nine-and-a-half months at Edel House. She battled drug and alcohol addiction and is now in recovery. Good Shepherd Cork has continued to support Jennifer's journey with housing, advocacy, and education. • At first Jennifer was unsure, but soon saw the benefits to the education program. "I thought it might not be for me at all. It's really changed me, helped me to get routine in my life. I hadn't had it for such a long time. I forgot what life was.

It's just shown me bit by bit. Computers, communications...•
just the people...everyone's caring! I realize that there really
is more to life." • Today, thanks to Good Shepherd Cork,

Jennifer has found a new level of independence
and is living in her own home.

JENNIFER'S STORY

is not uncommon in Ireland. Good Shepherd Cork works with these women, children and families who are homeless, or at risk of homelessness. Good Shepherd Cork is the only agency in Cork that can admit and care for children who are homeless. Grounded in a belief in social justice and equality, it addresses the root causes of homelessness and social exclusion and aims to break the cycle of homelessness through generations. All backgrounds, ages and stages of life are welcomed and served.

Life in emergency accommodation is extremely stressful for children. Research shows that homelessness in childhood can lead to poor health, low self-esteem, problems in school, alienation, and ultimately, as an adult, high risk of future homelessness. But as the homelessness crisis increases, people are staying in emergency accommodation for longer periods, typically several months and sometimes over a year as it becomes increasingly difficult to find affordable housing.

In response to this crisis, Good Shepherd Cork is providing women, children and families with a safe place to stay and practical supports to find and move on to secure long-term housing; along with a wide range of educational, therapeutic and emotional supports to build the resilience and coping skills to best manage the many stresses of homelessness. Its services include:

EDEL HOUSE: emergency accommodation:

Edel House is emergency accommodation for women and children who find themselves homeless. Every night there are over 50 women and children in residence with a staff that works with women to help them to return to independent living as quickly as possible.

REDCLYFFE: a family hub and support to families in Bed and Breakfast accommodation:

In mid-2018 Redclyffe was opened. It is a 70-bed 'family hub' to provide temporary accommodation for families. Outreach Workers support a further 50 families in B&Bs who cannot be accommodated at Edel House or Redclyffe when the services are at full capacity.

RIVERVIEW: residential care for teenage girls:

Riverview helps girls ages 15 - 19 who are homeless achieve greater resilience and wellbeing. Key workers engage on a one-to-one basis with each girl to help them to resolve issues and to move on to independent living or to return to their families, whichever is most appropriate.

BAILE AN AOIRE: longer-term supported and transitional housing:

Baile An Aoire offers quality accommodation to single adult women in a safe and nurturing community. There are also two apartments which provide transitional housing for vulnerable families.

BRUAC: education and development:

Good Shepherd Cork's Education & Development program, based at Bruac, offers fresh educational opportunities to girls and women who are unable to access mainstream education. Students are often highly vulnerable and dealing with a range of issues which prevent them accessing mainstream services. The approach is to place an equal emphasis on personal as well as educational development.

SUPPORT AND ADVOCACY:

A Support and Advocacy team personalizes services to meet the individual needs of each woman and child as they progress to sustainable independent living. Support and Advocacy workers actively involve women in decision making and planning, providing practical and emotional support as well as links to other appropriate services.

HOW HAS THE IRELAND FUNDS HELPED?

Good Shepherd Cork received two grants through the Small Grants Round 2017 and 2018, totalling €7,000. These grants have enabled women to stay in emergency accommodation and receive therapeutic support as well as education and personal development. The grants have also allowed them to provide summer camp places for children staying in emergency accommodation.

The Ireland Funds is pleased in addition to benefitting from the Small Grants Round, our introduction of Good Shepherd's work to other funding sources opened additional opportunities to the value of €300,000 over 3 years.

"There is a crisis of family homelessness in Ireland," says Allison Aldred, CEO of Good Shepherd Cork. "Support from The Ireland Funds is helping us to break this tragic cycle by allowing us to develop and deliver educational and therapeutic supports to women and children in our services, encouraging them to learn, develop skills, improve health and build their self-esteem and resilience and so better cope with and move on from the trauma of homelessness. It is these additional supports that can really make a positive difference to the long-term well-being of our service users and we are extremely grateful to The Ireland Funds for their encouragement and assistance."

ONGOING FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Good Shepherd Cork is seeking funds to be able to continue and expand these supports to families to include:

- . A drop-in facility for families staying in B&Bs where they could do laundry and make a family meal (estimated cost €20,000 set up and one year running costs).
- More one-to-one and group therapeutic supports for vulnerable women and children—e.g. counselling, play or art therapy, parent and toddler program (cost approx. €16,000)
- . A program of sports and physical activities for children living in emergency accommodation (cost approx. $\[\in \]$ 7,500)
- Furniture, bedding, kitchen items etc. for the newly-expanded Edel House facility. (cost approx. €120,500 to fully equip the expanded and re-furbished shelter)



GOOD SHEPHERD CORK

- In **2018**, Good Shepherd Cork worked with over **800 women** and children
- Regrettably, in 2018, Good Shepherd Cork's Edel House had to turn away 232 women and 230 children because all beds were full
- Women and children account for over 60% of homeless people in Cork
- In March of **2019**, the total number of **families who were homeless** in Cork City and County was **109**. This is a stark **increase of nearly 100%** in under a year
- The 109 homeless families include 245 children. 55 of these children are currently staying in emergency
 accommodation provided by Good Shepherd Cork (Edel House or Redclyffe family hub) and the remainder are in
 private emergency accommodation (B&Bs or hotels).

The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition 2019





The Ireland Funds has a long history of supporting excellence and addressing need in Ireland. Since 2012, and initially in response to the economic downturn, The Ireland Funds has run an annual Business Plan Competition that seeks to nurture creativity and hone entrepreneurial skills of Ireland's next generation of business leaders. By working in partnership with third-level institutions, innovation hubs and focusing on early stage entrepreneurs, the Business Plan Competition promotes the skills and resilience needed to develop indigenous industries, attract investors and, ultimately, to create jobs. Founded by San Francisco-based Board Director of The Ireland Funds America, Bill McKiernan of WSM Capital, LLC, The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition finalists have a chance to win cash prizes as well as additional supports and mentorship.

"I proposed the idea of a Business Plan Competition to The Ireland Funds in 2010 during the depths of the Irish recession,' said Bill McKiernan. "The economic climate in Ireland was pretty bleak at the time and it was clear that the biggest contribution The Ireland Funds could make to Ireland was to help create jobs. Young people in Ireland should be encouraged to take risks. They need to be more comfortable with failure and the lessons learned from it. The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition hopes to do that."

In 2017, The Ireland Funds began partnering with Ireland's National Digital Research Centre (NDRC) to deliver the Business Plan Competition. Funded by the Department of Communications, Climate Action and the Environment, NDRC finds, builds and invests in tech companies and start-up teams with the potential to grow internationally.

In June of 2019, after six weeks of rigorous mentorship at NDRC's start-up hub in Dublin, ten teams took part in the Business Plan Competition showcase at Ormeau Baths in Belfast where they pitched their ideas and fielded questions from the panel of stellar judges. Lily Devices, led by NUI Galway student Aaron Hannon, won the

top prize of €15,000 for their product that aims to prevent hair loss during chemotherapy using a unique headband device which offers patients a comfortable, dignified and portable treatment device for the prevention of hair loss during chemotherapy.

"The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition has been a fantastic opportunity for us to build our customer discovery skills and truly understand the problem we are working on,' said Aaron Hannon. "Over the course of the program, we radically redefined our strategy for market access having understood our customers in a whole new light. We now feel that, having been through The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition process, we are in a much stronger position to accelerate our technical development and deliver maximum patient impact when we get to market."

Second runner up this year was NearBy. Team members, Merim Dzaferagic, Irene Macaluso, Conor Sexton were awarded €7,000 for their product, which helps telecom operators optimize the network configuration by using smart, automated and adaptive optimization approaches.

Third runner up, SeamlessCARE supports the continuity of care for people with intellectual disability and complex needs. Via their platform, carers can take photographs, record videos and make notes to communicate the needs and preferences of each individual. Unique data analytics provides insights into patterns of care and translates the sounds made by non-verbal people so that every care provider can understand their communications.

For this most recent competition, The Ireland Funds partnered with St Patrick's Mental Health Services (SPMHS) to award a special prize of €5,000 to kick start a mental health-focused business plan. Auxilio scooped the prize for their app that provides between-session support to clients who are currently attending a therapist for psychological difficulties. This easy to use tool complements structured therapeutic interventions during moments of distress.

"The quality of candidates this year was second to none', said Director Ireland, The Ireland Funds, Caitriona Fottrell. "When the competition's founder Bill McKiernan launched this competition eight years ago, none of us anticipated how vital it would become in supporting ambitious young entrepreneurs to kick start their business plans. We are also incredibly proud of our new partnership with SPMHS, as this highlights the growth of the competition and we hope to welcome new collaborations and partnerships as we continue to evolve."

A Gonversation with BILL MCKIERNAN



Bill McKiernan is President of WSM Capital LLC and is a San Francisco-based Board Director of The Ireland Funds America. In 2012, Bill founded **THE IRELAND FUNDS BUSINESS PLAN COMPETITION** which today has stimulated the growth of numerous young companies and initiatives across the island of Ireland. This past June, Bill helped judge the Competition held in Belfast, Northern Ireland. Rachel Alabiso, Editor of *Connect* Magazine, spoke with Bill to learn more about his motivations for establishing the Competition and his views on the importance of The Ireland Funds in Ireland, Northern Ireland, and beyond.



Rachel Bill, how were you introduced to The Ireland Funds?

I was introduced to The Ireland Funds by its West Coast Director, Marjorie Muldowney. As I met people who were involved with The Ireland Funds and understood their passion and commitment to the Ireland, I started to become more involved. When I first got involved back in 2010 or so, Ireland was in a very difficult place. The Irish recession was in full force. Unemployment was very high. The economic climate in Ireland was pretty bleak. I felt the biggest contribution that we could make to Ireland was to help create jobs, because a job is the best philanthropy that anyone can provide.

Rachel So, you established The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition?

Yes. Back then we talked about the fact that every job starts with an entrepreneur. My belief was that entrepreneurship is critical to the long-term success of Ireland, just like it's critical to every country. When I looked at Ireland, to me, the big difference between Ireland and California, in terms of entrepreneurship, was the appetite for risk among young people.

Rachel Isn't that something you've spoken about at the Business Plan Competition, the idea that young people need to be more comfortable with risk and with failure?

Exactly. It's clear to me that the Irish are intellectually gifted. They're well-trained, and as innovative and creative as anyone, but from my experience, particularly the young people, they seem to be more risk-averse than the young people in the U.S.

Rachel What do you think is behind that?

Bill I think it's a cultural thing, and it's a function of their exposure to risk taking. In Northern California, if you walk into any Starbucks, you see business plan pitches going on at virtually every table. That's a function of the culture of Northern California. It was my belief that by exposing the young people in Ireland to the entrepreneurial process and to entrepreneurs, that they would be more comfortable with entrepreneurship, with failure and with the lessons that they can learn from that. That's really what the Business Plan Competition is all about. It's exposing young people in Ireland to entrepreneurs and to entrepreneurship in the hope that they become more comfortable starting their own businesses.

Rachel The Business Plan Competition has grown over the years to be so much more than that one day in June. We'd like to think that early-stage business ideas are really being identified and nurtured, and not just the first-place winners. Do you agree?

There's no question. The Competition is much less about finding a business plan that can become a billion-dollar company and much more about education. It's about getting the young people comfortable with the entrepreneurial process and thinking about entrepreneurship and thinking about what it takes to start a successful business. That may result in them pursuing the business they describe in the Business Plan Competition or it may be a business they develop at a future date because of the lessons they learned at the Business Plan Competition.

Rachel Have you stayed in touch with any of these teams going forward? Do you keep an eye on them as they grow?

Yes, I occasionally get calls from some of the folks and they'll provide me with updates. The quality of the business plans has really improved over the years.

Rachel *Tell us a bit more about that.*

Bill I think that's a function of a few things. I think that the Competition has become more widely known, so we're getting applicants from a broader population. I think the collaboration with the National Digital Research Centre (NDRC) has really been a positive development in the Business Plan Competition. NDRC provides ongoing mentorship. They run a bootcamp for the competitors before the final competition, and they allow them to refine their business plans and refine their pitches, and so they've been instrumental in making the pitches much more compelling. Then, afterward, they provide an incubation facility so that teams can pursue their dreams. NDRC has really been a positive development for the Competition.

Rachel Where do you see the Business Plan Competition going in the next few years? Are there areas that can be improved?

Bill I think one thing I would like to see is a tighter collaboration with the nine universities in Ireland. We work with the professors of entrepreneurship or engineering or economics, and educate them about the nature of the competition, encourage them to encourage their students to think about entrepreneurship and think about the Business Plan Competition and submit plans. I do think that a tighter collaboration with the universities would expand the impact of the Competition, because then within each university there will be some momentum around entrepreneurship that continues throughout the year.

Rachel How do you feel about the growing social entrepreneurship movement in Ireland?

Bill I think that's a function of young peoples' awareness about social responsibility today versus past generations. I'm very encouraged by that. In many ways, a lot of what The Ireland Funds does is about social entrepreneurship. It's about encouraging people to solve problems in creative ways.

Rachel Bill, you're a National Board Director of The Ireland Funds America. Has all of that helped you stay connected to Ireland?

Even though San Francisco's pretty far away from Ireland, the Irish have a rich history in San Francisco. I feel The Ireland Funds, and Marjorie in particular, do a great job of celebrating that rich history. We have an Irish consulate in San Francisco, and they do a lot of things as well, but also, the economic climate in San Francisco attracts a lot of Irish business interests.

I think The Ireland Funds acts as a sort of force multiplier there in generating more interest in Ireland and celebrating Irish culture in San Francisco. That's in large part thanks to Marjorie. She does a great job.

Rachel Bill, here's a big picture question: Why Ireland? Why is it important for members of the Irish diaspora to continue to have that relationship with Ireland and Northern Ireland? People can focus their philanthropy in so many places.

In some respects, this is a watershed moment in Irish history. Brexit is creating a lot of uncertainty in the Republic and Northern Ireland. I also think it's creating a lot of opportunity for both countries, but the important thing is that you don't go backwards to the Troubles, and I believe the diaspora can help by staying engaged and supporting causes for which they have some passion.

Rachel What was it like for you to be at The Ireland Funds Worldwide Conference in Belfast last June? Did it feel like people connected with what's going on in Northern Ireland?

Fill Yes. It was great to be back in Belfast. I've had some experiences over the years in Northern Ireland and going back this year for the Conference showed us the vibrancy of the Belfast community. The evidence of that is everywhere, the construction, the energy in the streets. It's really gratifying to see that. But as I said, we're in a moment in history where a lot of things are going to change, and so it's important that we continue that momentum.

Rachel Would you say it's a vibrancy and a fragility?

Yes. That fragility is there and unfortunately it creates a sort of a vacuum. We know what happened with that vacuum during the Troubles. It's really important that we help continue the positive momentum of the last 20 years.

Rachel What do you see the role of The Ireland Funds being as we go forward?

I think in terms of The Ireland Funds, that just being in Belfast this past June was a positive thing. I think also staying involved is key. We saw several projects while we were there that encourage reconciliation and peace. I went to see PeacePlayers. It's a grassroots effort to encourage positive interactions between communities.

Another donor at the Conference had an opportunity to see the Derry Playhouse. They told me it was one of the most emotional days they have ever had. It's those kinds of efforts at a grassroots level that can produce positive change.

Rachel The Ireland Funds do persist. It's been an unrelenting commitment to every single generation to show them that we're still going to be there, and we're going to keep supporting initiatives that build cross-community strength.

Bill It's not unlike what I describe to entrepreneurs. They'll often ask, 'what's the thing you did to finally make the business successful?' It's no single thing. It's like pushing a flywheel, and you just keep pushing the flywheel until eventually the flywheel gets momentum and sustains itself.

Rachel That's a great metaphor.

Bill That's true in business. It's true in the peace process. You just keep doing lots of little things that eventually result in the momentum swinging in the right direction.



Inner City Enterprise (ICE) was established to advise and assist unemployed people in Dublin's inner city to set up their own businesses or create their own self-employment. Over the last 7 years, ICE has helped 2,000 people establish over 1,000 for-profit and social enterprises in Ireland. The support of The Ireland Funds Australia in 2019 will enable ICE to:

- Hold 28 training and networking workshops and events
- Establish a formal mentoring program
- Organize a Corporate Social Enterprise Adoption Program involving the adoption of seven social enterprise programs by private sector companies

In County Limerick, Learning Hub Limerick (LHL) is a place where art, science, music, health, stories and digital learning for children all come together. In disadvantaged areas of Limerick only 6% of young people progress to a university education, so instilling a love of learning is key. With our help LHL can achieve their

- Creating an active learning environment that extends beyond the traditional
- Creatively embedding technology and the core skills of literacy and numeracy into active learning projects across all curriculum areas
- Preventing early school leaving and raise the educational aspirations of families, schools and the wider community





Community Action Network (CAN) supports

communities facing a range of socio-economic challenges in the south inner-city neighborhoods of Dublin. The support of The Ireland Funds Australia will provide core funding to strengthen and develop 8 of CAN's initiatives in the challenging areas of:

- Threats to community safety from the drug-economy
- Having to support a large number of community members who are distant from the labor market
- Poor housing conditions

Shoulder to shoulder, the Irish Men's Sheds Association is improving the health and well-being of men across Ireland. Originally an Australian initiative, Men's Sheds creates a community space for men of all ages to gather in a safe, friendly environment where they can work on interesting projects. There are currently 422 Men's Sheds in Ireland and an estimated 10,000 men use Men's Sheds each week across the country. This wonderful initiative is supported by the Australian Young Leaders.





Inspired by Jim Stynes' Reach Foundation of Melbourne, SOar is a collective movement which believes that there is greatness within all young people. The foundation delivers early intervention-preventative, wellness workshops for young people aged 12 - 18 years from all backgrounds. With programs that aim to help young people fulfil their true potential, since 2012 Soar has worked with more than 30,000 young people in Ireland. Since 2015 The Ireland Funds Australia has contributed more than \$195,000 in grants to Soar.

Proudly supported by the Australian Young Leaders, CaraCare provides innovative and unique group work programs for children who have been abused in the Greater Sydney area. Trained trauma therapists assist children in overcoming trauma by harnessing the innate healing potential of music, dance, movement and creative art forms. "Cara" is the Irish word for friend and there can be no more fitting name for a program that exists to promote resilience and recovery through the power of community and creativity.





Pioneered by Trinity College Dublin and part of a global network, Science Gallery Melbourne aims to engage young adults through the collision of arts and science, with 75% of future jobs requiring STEM qualifications. The Ireland Funds Australia are proud to be in the 3rd year of partnership with SGM, including funding which assisted:

- Launch of the first exhibition BLOOD
- Indigenous Cadetship
- · Regional Schools Outreach

Australian Indigenous Education Foundation (AIEF)

is a private sector led non-profit organization focused on empowering Indigenous children to build a future through quality education and careers at Australian schools, universities and companies. The partnership between AIEF and The Ireland Funds Australia means 80 scholarship places by 2020.

In 2018 the AIEF scholarship students achieved

- a 92% retention and Year 12 completion rate
- 97% tertiary retention and completion rate

The Ireland Funds Great Britain awards £155,000 to community organizations

The Ireland Funds Great Britain (IFGB) has announced the recipients of its 2018 Grant Round. The IFGB has awarded £155,000 to 37 deserving organizations working with and for the Irish community in Great Britain, Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland. The objective of the Grant Round is to contribute much needed funds to organizations across Great Britain and the island of Ireland with projects supporting: community development, culture, peace and reconciliation, and education.

Over 100 applications were received when the grant round opened in October of 2018, double the number of applications in the previous year. Chair of the IFGB Grants Committee, Seamus McGarry, said: "the increase in the number of applications received this year demonstrates the real need that still exists in the Irish community today. The Ireland Funds is proud to support many grassroots organizations and the vital work that they do to help the vulnerable in our communities and to promote Ireland and Irish culture."

Director Katie Jemmett said: "the purpose of the IFGB is to create a positive social impact and to make a real difference to those working and living in our communities. It is our aim to grow our Grant Round year on year and increase our impact and reach, and we are grateful to all of our donors and supporters who fund our work and make it possible for us to assist these excellent organizations."

In addition to the Grant Round, The Ireland Funds Great Britain distributed over half a million pounds to charities through its Donor Advised Grants program in 2018.

The IFGB Grant Round awardees demonstrate the breadth of work carried out by community organizations across Great Britain and the island of Ireland. Projects supported this year include: creative podcasts which look at Irish identity; the establishment of a men's shed; a cross-community filmmaking project for young people aged 11-19; engaging Travelers in suitable training, education and work experience; the provision of day services to elderly Irish people; a music bursary for composition of classical music on Irish themes; development of an IT education course for older Irish community members; educational resources for Irish speakers in London; and the provision of group therapy for carers and socially isolated adults.






Belfast Global Leadership Series with John Healy







London Global Leadership Series with John Griffin

APRIL, 2019 Straight-talking businessman John Griffin, founder of Addison Lee, a company he grew to become one of London's most identifiable brands, joined The Ireland Funds Great Britain at the Lansdowne Club in Mayfair to share his story and insights with the Young Leaders. Mr. Griffin, 76, started his business with one car in 1975 and sold it in 2013 for £300 million. During the course of the one-hour session, he repeated his belief in hard work, being alert to opportunities to win business, being self-disciplined, believing in one's self and the benefits of loving what you do, as being key components in achieving long-term success. However, Mr. Griffin also cautioned the Young Leaders to keep family as a priority in life. An active philanthropist,

he explained that **The John Griffin Foundation** has committed £10 million to building an extension to the Northwick Park Institute for Medical Research in north London. The center is leading the way in regenerative medicine, specifically around the development of natural tissue scaffolds to replace surgically removed or traumatized tissues. In addition, he is an Investor in the Royal Mint Gardens Development in London.

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
